From there, remarkably, they were chosen to come to America. Lost Boys of Sudan won an Independent Spirit Award and screened theatrically in 70 cities across the U.S. to strong audience and critical praise. The film was broadcast nationally on the PBS series POV in the fall of 2004 and earned two Emmy nominations. The Lost Boys' story has a tremendously broad appeal and touches people deeply. An extensive national outreach campaign is capturing this energy and making the film a powerful educational and community organizing tool. Film events have raised more than half million dollars in direct educational support for the Sudanese youth across the country. Screenings everywhere from Capitol Hill to church basements have raised awareness and funding; motivated lobbying and volunteerism; and sparked new support groups and community collaborations. The campaign will continue through 2006 with a focus on public libraries, high schools and college campuses.
